The development of an Energy Masterplan was commenced, with energy use data being supplied to Department of Planning Industry and Environment for consideration and review.

The solar system at the Fivebough Sewage Treatment Plant generated 75,586kWh of power. At a usage charge of 0.06c/kWh, Council's energy costs were reduced by \$4515.06.

Maintenance activities were undertaken at Fivebough Wetlands. These activities included the:

- repair of two sections of the walking track
- cleanout and reshaping of water supply channels
- general weed control
- installation of safety rails on the wetland lookouts.

In addition, a light and a security camera were installed in the visitor carpark to improve visitor safety. The carpark has also been added to the Police nighttime patrols.

A new 5-minute Fivebough Wetlands promotional video was launched in February.

the Water Conservation and Irrigation Commission (WCIC) building.

## **Plans of Management**

Council continues to develop its plans of management for Councilowned land and facilities. Three plans of management were completed and adopted by Council including the Racecourse, Library and LELC.

### **Service Reviews**

Service reviews of the Library and the Leeton Early Learning Centre were commenced or completed.

#### Finance

User fees and charges increased from a budgeted annual figure of \$7.09M to an updated budget of \$9.26M at the March budget review. Council receipted \$9.49M as at 30 June prior to any year-end transactions. Council's Average Yield for the quarter ending 30 June 2020 was 1.63% (2.67% As 30 June 2019). This is 1.53% above the Bank Bill Swap 90day rate. To support its ongoing financial sustainability, Council has current investments of \$47.3M.

### Workforce

Council continued to 'grow its own' workforce through internal development opportunities such as providing leadership training and enabling staff to undertake higher duties. Council's staff turnover is approximately 14.4% (compared to an average of 14% for NSW local government).
